Author's Note - An Introduction to the Book

'Our Country, Our People' is my first book on India. I seek the blessings of all elders and the good wishes of our younger generation of our vibrant and promising India and all the people of the world to continue my author journey. I am passionate about people and feel the pains and sorrows of the disadvantaged and the oppressed classes in our country and wish to heal and cure them by sharing the information about their extremely-challenged lives with the public. The marginalised classes may not have access to this book, but all readers certainly do.

Having done some basic studies in Organisational Psychology and Human Resources Management, to me, there appears to be no better subject than 'People' to talk about. I have served our nation by being in the Indian Armed Forces for 37 years.

When I started my journey of writing this book, I had planned to title it, 'For Indians Only'. In hindsight, I realised that the title may offend some well-wishers, both permanent Indian citizens and those settled abroad and also all those who perceive India not any differently from the rest. Later, I titled it, 'Not the India of our Dreams, but the India We Really wish to Live in'. Better sense prevailed and a far better and apt title - 'The India, we wish to Live in' took its place. Further, the title - 'Our Country, Our People and the subtitle - The India, We wish to Live in', rightly replaced all the earlier ones.

The idea for this book came up for various reasons. A few of the reasons that support and justify my convictions are:

- a. Humanity is central to our very existence. Rest, come much later.
- b. When we can love plants, animals and nature, can't we love humanity equally? And, why not more?
- c. All citizens of all nations are proud of their citizenships and are profoundly devout in their nationalistic spirit. So, nationalism is natural, inborn and also duly inherited! Patriotism is another

- characteristic trait which appears to have an edge over nationalism, however, it hardly matters whether a person is a nationalist or a patriot till the time the person has an unconditional love and fondness for her or his nation! It is just that she or he feels that they belong there and nowhere else!
- d. Heredity has defined our origins and we must respect that. A new-born child has no option but to belong to the family or dynasty and its original clan, society and country. What becomes of us later is our doing and of our own free will and well-considered choices.
- e. We need to know why, 'Not the India of our dreams, but the India we really wish to live in'? Of the many possible answers to this question, just two are mentioned below:-
 - The India of our dreams would sound too wild and may be pure fantasy as we have to live in reality. Too many conflicting factors in the environment may negate the shaping of most of our dreams.
 - The India we really wish to live in can always be hoped for, prayed for and aspired for by any Indian in the normal course.
- f. As to why I chose to author this book about our Mother India? Well, India is on the cusp of re-building and transforming and also contributing mightily towards not just a 'New World Order' but towards a 'Pro-World Order'. We are an immensely-tolerant nation and believe in inclusiveness and invariably underline togetherness. Unequivocal Indianness is within each of us. An Indian author can get the real feel of India and feel for India, distinctively. Indians will agree!
- g. Last but not the least, isn't there a resentment amongst people that much more could still be done to alleviate the sufferings of the deserving class and is yet not happening? A lot is indeed being done for the good of the masses. Total immersion into the acts of service with utmost humility alone will bear fruits of progress because at some stage in life, our conscience is bound to outsmart our veiled notions of success. We must also selflessly curb the yearning for fame, name, popularity, glory and materialism and most importantly, the craving for leaving

behind a legacy. Let us all leave behind imprints on the sands of time through good work rather than popular work. Let the results and visibility be seen from the eyes of the benefitted people and not the doer. There is positivity in the air and better times are just ahead.....
